# **INDUSTRY BY SECTOR**

#### HOMECARE PRIMARY PAYERS: PRIVATE PAY, MEDICAID

Homecare agencies provide non-medical services to help individuals with activities of daily living (ADLs), like transferring from a chair or bed, toileting, bathing, and getting dressed.

### HOME HEALTH PRIMARY PAYERS: MEDICARE, SOME MEDICAID

Home health provides skilled services, including nursing care and physical, occupational, speech and respiratory therapy. These services are usually short-term, as in the case of a person recovering from surgery or other time-limited health issues.

#### HOSPICE PRIMARY PAYERS: MEDICARE, SOME MEDICAID

Hospice care brings together medical care, pain management and emotional and spiritual support for terminal patients and their families. Eighty percent of hospice care is provided in the patient's home.

# **2023 LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES**

- Increase state funding for non-medical personal assistance services and shift nursing under the Commonwealth's Medical Assistance Program so that providers can offer competitive wages and meet the increasing demand for services.
- Support initiatives for workforce development for the healthcare continuum to protect and preserve access to high quality in-home care.
- Continue the use of virtual interviewing in home care to allow for efficient hiring and onboarding.
- Allow LPNs to make pronouncements of death in the hospice setting.
- Support meaningful updates to the Older Adult Protective Services Act to keep seniors safe while also protecting access to quality care.
